

Your Voice, Your Vote: A Guide to Accessible Voting in Wyoming (2026)



In the Equality State, the right to cast a ballot is a cornerstone of our community. For Wyomingites with disabilities, federal and state laws ensure that your vote is private, independent, and accessible. Whether you are voting in the Primary or the General Election, here is your roadmap for 2026.

Primary vs. General: What You Need to

Know



Wyoming holds two major elections in 2026. While the General Election decides who wins the office, the Primary Election determines which candidates will represent each party.

- **The Primary Election (August 18, 2026):** Wyoming has a “closed” primary for registered voters.
 - **Important Deadline:** If you are already registered and want to change your party affiliation (e.g., Republican to Democrat), you **must** do so by **May 13, 2026**. You cannot change your party at the polls on Primary Day.
 - **New Voters:** If you are registering for the first time, you can declare your party at the polls on election day.

- **The General Election (November 3, 2026):** This is the final vote where you choose between all candidates on

the ballot, regardless of your party.

Service Animals at the Polls



Under the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and Wyoming law, you have a clear right to be accompanied by your service animal.

- **Access:** You may bring your service animal into any polling place, even if the building (like a school or church) has a “no pets” policy.
- **Definition:** A service animal is specifically defined as a dog (or in some cases, a miniature horse) that is trained to do work or perform tasks for a person with a disability.
- **What Staff Can Ask:** Poll workers may only ask two questions:

1. Is the animal required because of a disability?
2. What work or task has the animal been trained to perform? *They cannot ask about your specific disability or require "certification" papers for the animal.*

Voting Options: In-Person and Absentee



Wyoming offers several ways to ensure every voter can participate comfortably:

- **Accessible Machines:** Every polling place is equipped with an [ExpressVote](#) system. It features touchscreens, large text, high-contrast modes, and audio-ballot options with headphones for those with visual impairments.

- **Curbside Voting:** If getting into the building is a challenge, you can vote from your car. Simply have a companion alert the poll workers, or call your County Clerk's office ahead of time to arrange for two election judges to bring your ballot to the curb.
 - **Absentee (Mail-in) Voting:** No excuse is needed to vote absentee.
 - **Primary Absentee Period:** July 21 – August 17, 2026.
 - **General Absentee Period:** October 6 – November 2, 2026.

Note on Identification: Wyoming requires a valid photo ID for in-person voting. If you don't have one, you can [obtain a free ID for voting purposes](#) through your local Driver Services office.
